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# Essential information about your booking

# Your booking,

# What is included, including workshops and lunch space

Our reduced admission rates for school groups include any learning programme(s) and lunch spaces you have booked, and admission to all areas of Windsor Castle that are open on the day of your visit. Audio guides are not available to school groups at Windsor Castle.

Schools who have booked a lunch-space will leave their bags in a secure locker and collect them prior to their allocated lunch time. Schools must adhere strictly to workshop and lunchtimes as the Castle can experience several schools on any given day. **Children / schools will be required to take all rubbish back to school with them following their visit.** Teachers will be asked to ensure the lunch room is left tidy and clean for the next group.

# Changes to your booked numbers

It is essential that you let us know in advance of any additions to your numbers. If you need additional tickets (child and/or adult), you may purchase these in advance through the Learning Bookings team on the telephone number above. Any additions to the group not communicated and paid for in advance will be asked to pay the standard admission price on the day of the visit. We are not able to invoice for tickets after your visit.

# Making pre-visits, Please book at least 24 hours in advance.

If you and a colleague would like to make a planning visit to the Castle before your group visit, please contact the Learning Bookings on Learning@rct.uk to arrange two complimentary tickets. This will help you create your own Risk Assessment. It will also help you gauge what is possible during your visit e.g. queues are common at peak times should schools want to see the Doll's House.

You will receive a booking reference number and your tickets will be available for collection on the arranged date, at the Group Ticket Desk in the Admission Centre (main visitor entrance). Please note the Learning Centre is only operational during school days in term time and so may be closed if you visit at other times.

Under the guidance of our Fire, Health and Safety Branch, an established policy sets out staff and management responsibilities for all areas of activity. <u>Please ensure that your school risk assessment covers</u> <u>alighting and boarding the coach and progress from your drop off / pick up point to</u> <u>and from the Learning Centre gates.</u>

All areas at Windsor Castle open for visitor admissions have been assessed both for compliance with current Health and Safety requirements and with the provisions of the Equality Act (2010).

Regular inspections by operational, maintenance, and health and safety staff ensure that high levels of safety and visitor service are maintained. Cleaning and maintenance staff are available at all times during public opening hours, together with supervisory staff under the direction of a Duty Manager.

*Emergency procedures are published for all public areas, and staff undertake regular fire and evacuation training. All wardens are in radio contact.* 

Secure visitor access is achieved by screening all visitors and by the presence of the Royalty and Diplomatic Protection Branch of the Metropolitan Police Force. CCTV is in operation throughout

This statement summarise the main provisions of the Castle's policy and can be used on your documents.

The Royal Household has undertaken workplace **risk assessments** to cover all areas of operation within the Castle and they are reviewed on a regular basis. These are available for viewing, but on account of the sensitive nature of the venue, we do not issue them to external organisations. In order for you to carry out risk assessments specific to your group and their needs, we offer complimentary tickets for group leaders – please see Making pre-visits on p2.

# GUIDELINES FOR SCHOOL VISITS TO WINDSOR CASTLE

In order that everyone has a safe and enjoyable visit to Windsor Castle, we ask that school groups follow these guidelines.

During the visit, teachers and adult helpers are responsible for their pupils' safety and behaviour at all times and must stay with their group. Please ensure that all adult helpers are fully aware of this responsibility. Adult helpers should also be advised that they may need to work with the pupils in their care, encouraging observation and discussion and helping them complete worksheets, trails and sometimes art projects.

## SAFETY

- Your group must follow instructions given by members of the Learning team, uniformed wardens and police officers in and around the Castle and adhere to social distancing markers in place
- Wristbands will be given to lead teachers and secondary children, which enable our wardens to identify your group and help ensure your safety. All students should stay with their group leader.
- \* All adults and children must be made aware that they need to give way to vehicles within the Castle walls and along the public highways between the Learning Centre and the Castle.
- \* If you suffer an accident or medical emergency while at the Castle, please contact a uniformed warden who will promptly call first-aid trained staff to help you.

## BEHAVIOUR

Pupils must adhere to a reasonable code of behaviour, as they would when at school. This includes:

- \* walking calmly in all areas and not running at any time,
- \* treating other visitors and Castle personnel with respect,
- \* behaving sensibly when using lavatories and visiting the Castle shops.

**NOTE**: children should be supervised at all times to maintain appropriate conduct and to ensure their safety. and appropriate social distancing.

### GENERAL

- \* Large groups should be separated into smaller units to explore the Castle to ensure everyone has the opportunity to enjoy and learn from its unique atmosphere.
- \* No one may touch or get too close to any of the objects on display.
- \* Your group may use pencils in the Castle but not felt tips, wax crayons, pastels, cartridge pens or other potentially messy materials.
- \* The use of cameras / audio / video equipment is not permitted inside the Castle buildings or in St George's Chapel.



#### I. SECONDARY SCHOOL GROUPS

#### Drop off

For <u>KS3, KS4 and KS5 groups</u> your coach driver must take you directly to the town coach park (marked in purple on the map, with further information in the link below).

https://www.rbwm.gov.uk/home/transport-and-streets/parking/car-parks-and-park-and-ride/car-park/coach-park Under the local authority rules coach parties of KS3 and above are not entitled to a coach pass that permits the driver to pass through the town to drop off outside the Castle.

There is a clearly signposted walkway from the coach park to the Castle. Entry to the Castle is through a special schools entry gate half way down St Alban's Street, <u>not</u> the main Visitor Entrance. Members of the Learning team will be outside this gate to meet you.

#### Collection

KS3, KS4 and KS5 groups will need to return to the coach park for collection. Coaches for these age groups are not permitted to wait in any of the roads immediately surrounding the Castle.

#### 2. NURSERY AND PRIMARY SCHOOL GROUPS

#### Coach Pass

Nursery and Primary school groups are entitled to a coach pass which allows the coach to drive through the town to one of the 2 dropping off and collection points marked on the map.

1 Drop off

Drop off point I is on the High Street of Windsor at the bus stop outside the parish church of St John the Baptist (as marked on the map). Only the bus stop immediately outside the church can be used, not the bus stop on the opposite side of the road. Drivers must use the full length of the bus stop. There are a number of other local services that drop off at the stop and should wherever possible not be impended. There is space for only I coach at a time at this bus stop. If Drop off point I is full you will need to follow the yellow route marked on the map to Drop off point 2. If there is already a coach using Drop off point I your driver must follow the yellow route marked on the map



to Drop off point 2.

Drop off point 2 is the bus stop on the High Street on the opposite side of the road to the Theatre Royal Windsor. Note that only the bus stop opposite the theatre can be used, there is no space to stop directly outside the theatre.

Entry to the Castle is through a special schools entry gate half way down St Alban's Street, <u>not</u> the main Visitor Entrance. Members of the Learning team will be outside this gate to meet you

#### Collection

Collection point is the same as drop off point 1 on the map (the bus stop immediately outside the parish church on Windsor High Street) The lead teacher should call the driver when to go there by mobile phone, only when the school group is ready to leave. Schools have a 5 minute pick up time on the High Street. Coaches must not wait on the High Street or any roads near the Castle but need to meet the group as it exits. <u>Council enforcement officers are regularly on duty in the town centre to ensure these guidelines are adhered to.</u> Only one coach at a time can use this bus stop. If needed, schools should use the waiting area beside the Guildhall (<u>not</u> up the steps) to ensure the pavement is not blocked at any time. If there is already a coach at collection point 1 you will need to follow the yellow route marked on the map to Collection point 2. Drop off point 2 is the bus stop on the High Street on the opposite side of the road to the Theatre Royal Windsor.

#### Late Arrival

If you are delayed, please inform the Learning Centre on 01753 868286 ext. 2442, especially if you have booked a timed learning session.

If your coach arrives in the town between 10:30 and 11:00 on Guard Change days, the driver may be directed to go straight to the coach park with the group (see map) as the Police do not allow any vehicle to stop in the security area around the Castle when the Guard are preparing to march through the town. From the coach park you will find a sign-posted walkway to the Castle.

Note St. Alban's Street is now a no through road.



# (for schools who have booked lunch space or taught sessions)

The Learning Centre provides a base from which you can tour the Castle. It is fully accessible to wheelchair users. The Centre has designated toilets for schools groups, drinking water available and also has a stock of clipboards / ear defenders and other kit.

Upon arrival at the gate, a member of the Learning team will discuss details of your visit and housekeeping issues with you. You will be issued with red Class Teacher lanyards, which allow entry to the Castle throughout the day and which identify your group to staff in the Castle. Please don't forget to return your lanyards to the Learning Centre at the end of your visit.

Everyone will be asked to put any baggage through an x-ray machine and walk through a metal detector arch. Due to the large number of visitors the Castle is experiencing we would ask that baggage brought into the Castle is limited, as this will allow more efficient flow through the



The new lunch hall can hold three classes for lunch at the same time. Upon arrival you will be allocated a **30 minute** time slot for lunch and schools must adhere to these times as there are often a large number of children using the facilities.

By staggering times for lunch, we try to ensure the communal spaces and lavatories are never overcrowded. security area. Sharp objects such as scissors and penknives will be removed.

You will then be directed to the yard and asked

to leave all bags/picnic lunches in the trolleys provided. These will be delivered to the Lunch Hall when you arrive for lunch with your group.





You are asked to ensure; that food and rubbish are not left on the floor, that all waste is collected and removed following your visit, and that tables are wiped and floors swept before you leave your area. (supplies are provided)

You may like your group to let off steam before or after your visit and in good weather your pupils can walk to and have a run around on the *Long Walk,* only a few minutes' walk from the Castle entrance.

Accompanying adults must remain with the children at all times. Adults cannot leave the Castle grounds once inside the security perimeter. There are no facilities for hot drinks for adults at the Centre. Staff are encouraged to bring picnic with them. The whole of Windsor Castle is strictly a no-smoking venue and this includes vaping of any kind.

# Learning programmes

Many of our introductory talks, role play sessions and costume handling workshops are held in the Learning Centre Classrooms while others take place in the Castle Precincts, State Apartments and St George's Chapel. These locations are marked on the map of the Castle.

Details of learning programme(s) booked will be on your booking letter. Please read these documents carefully as they give you important information about session content, length and location. You must allow about **20 minutes** between arrival at the Learning Centre and the start time of your first booked session to allow for registration, use of lavatories and for passing through security etc. By arriving promptly for your session you will help us deliver our



full programme to your group and to others using the schools' service on the same day.

## **Resource material**

We offer a range of resource material suitable for the age and ability of your pupils. We have trails for **KS1/2** to use on their visits as well as a **KS3** resource *In the Footsteps of Medieval Kings* to support the study of castle building in the medieval period. We offer a huge range of Pre and Post visit resources which are tailored to the workshops. Please visit: <u>resources</u>

We also have exciting interactive games for **KS1/2** children: *Windsor Castle: Bring on the Battle*, looking at means of attack and defence of medieval castles, and *King of the Castle: Henry's Windsor,* helping children learn about Henry VIII, his court at Windsor and his family.

# **Special Educational Needs and Disabilities**



All the facilities at the Learning Centre are accessible to wheelchair users, and in the Castle there is a special route into the State Apartments avoiding a long flight of steps. The wardens in the Castle will be pleased to help you access this. Please note that, for safety reasons, there is a limit on the number of wheelchairs allowed in the Apartments at any one time. In the Learning Centre, Engine Court and on the North Terrace you will find accessible lavatories and 'Changing Places' facility.

Our learning programmes are designed to be accessible to all pupils and most of our taught sessions can be adapted to meet any special educational needs your pupils have. We also offer a sensory talk which can be used by PMLD groups



# **Introduction to Windsor Castle**

Windsor Castle is an official residence of The Queen and one of her favourite homes. It is the oldest and largest inhabited castle in the world and has been a royal home since the first wooden fortress was built here at the time of William the Conqueror.

The Castle has been transformed over time into a splendid palace, while still retaining much evidence of its turbulent past. It provides an unforgettable learning environment for school visits linked to History, Geography, English, RE, Science, Art & Design and to cross-curricular themes.



First Norman king, William I, built earth and timber fortress at Windsor around 1070-80 to protect the western approach to London from attack by hostile Saxons. # Latest News -

## Concerns regarding infectious diseases in the community

- If the class due to visit had a child off school with an unconfirmed case of Covid-19, the class can attend as planned.
- If there is a confirmed case within the school but the class is currently unaffected, then the class can attend.
- If the class due to visit had a confirmed case of Covid-19, we can rearrange an alternate date, if desired, or offer a full refund should you wish to cancel the visit.
- If a case of Covid-19 is confirmed within the class shortly after you have visited, we would expect you to communicate with NHS Test and Trace, if, appropriate and also contact us via <u>learning@rct.uk</u> so that our staff can be made aware.

In the case that your school needs to implement significant *stepping - up* measures or is required to lockdown, we would try to rearrange your visit to an alternate date, if possible, or offer a full refund for a cancelled visit.

## The final resting place of Queen Elizabeth II.

• Following the enormous outpouring of grief at the death of our beloved Queen, Elizabeth II, key areas of the Castle are likely to be busier than usual, such as the late Queen's final resting place within St George's Chapel. Please be aware that there may be significant queues and waiting times. We ask that children remain respectful at all times and mindful of other visitors.
